NOTICE

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR A REDUCTION ON YOUR CITY PROPERTY TAX AND WATER RATES

With certain household income limitations, you may be eligible for a reduction on your city property tax and water rates during fiscal year 2022. (Beginning July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022)

The household income, excluding Social Security and disability pension, is limited to:

Single Applicant:	\$20,000
Married Applicants:	\$25,000 (combined income)
Household:	\$25,000 (total household income)

You may be eligible if you were 65 years of age or a disabled resident on SSI and have owned your current residence for one (1) year, by December 31, 2020, and your income does not exceed the limits above.

1. You must submit the following documents with your application: Copy of Federal Tax Form (1040) for 2020. *If you do not file a Federal Tax Form, you must submit: a copy of 2020 Social Security Benefit Statements, a copy of 2020 interest statements, and a copy of 2020 pension statements if applicable.*
2. Proof of income for all household residents over 18 years old
3. *Certificate of Insurance Award if disabled*
4. Proof of age and address (Matching items 1-3 above) shall be presented. These include
5. Picture ID, License, or Birth Certificate for homeowner applying for discount.

Applications for Exemptions are available at Town Hall. If you need assistance filling out the application please feel free to stop by Town Hall, and we will be glad to assist you. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30AM to 4:30PM.

PLEASE NOTE: This application form and the required documents must be submitted every year to demonstrate continued eligibility.

Every person:

1. Who maintains their permanent place of residence within the City limits of Delaware City.
2. Who has reached the age of eighteen (18) years.
3. Who is a citizen of the United States.
4. Who is registered to vote under the State of Delaware's voter registration system maintained by the Department of Elections at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the Election.
5. Who can prove the foregoing information by proper identification.

You can register to vote at ivote.de.gov and follow the instructions to register to vote. If you do not have a computer, you can come to Town Hall, 407 Clinton Street, during normal business hours (Mon-Fri 8:30-4:30) and we will help you register.

What Should You Do If A Coastal Storm Threatens Your Community?

There are two paths to take

FAMILY PREPAREDNESS TIPS FOR EVACUATING DURING A COASTAL STORM

- 1 Stay alert to storm advisories. Watch and Warning—know the difference.
- 2 Enact your family disaster plan
- 3 Map out your route. Use travel routes specified by local authorities. DO NOT get on the road without a place to go.
- 4 Fill your car with gasoline
- 5 Evacuate if told to do so. DO NOT get stranded. EVACUATE EARLY.
- 6 Enact your pet plan. Before a storm threatens, contact your veterinarian or local humane society for information on preparing your pets for an emergency. Shelters do not usually accept pets.
- 7 Bring your disaster supply kit. Including important documents, identification, and proof of residency.
- 8 Secure your home before leaving. Board up windows and glass doors, anchor loose yard objects or bring them inside and lock your doors.
- 9 Get cash. Following a coastal storm, banks and ATMs may be temporarily closed.
- 10 Notify family and friends of your plans.
- 11 When evacuating, if possible, evacuate to the home of either friends or family in a non-vulnerable area within your county. Next, try a motel or hotel and as a last resort go to a shelter.

People who require special assistance in evacuating should register with their local emergency management office.

Disaster Supply Kit

WATER—at least 1 gallon daily per person for 3 days

FOOD—at least enough for 3 days

- non-perishable packaged or canned food/jars
- food for infants or the elderly
- snack foods
- non-electric can opener
- cooking tools/knife
- paper plates/plastic utensils

CLOTHING—seasonal / rain gear / sturdy shoes

BLANKETS/PILLOWS, etc.

FIRST AID KIT/ MEDICINES

- prescription and non-prescription medications
- glasses, dentures, hearing aids, etc.

SPECIAL ITEMS—for babies and elderly

TOILETRIES—Hygiene items

MOISTURE WIPES

FLASHLIGHT/ BATTERIES

RADIO— Battery Operated and NOAA Weather Radio

CASH

KEYS—Extra set of home and car keys

IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS in a waterproof container

- insurance, medical records, bank account numbers, Social Security card, etc.
- identification and proof of residency such as a utility bill
- document all valuables

TOYS/BOOKS/ ENTERTAINMENT

TOOLS—Keep a set with you during the storm

VEHICLE FUEL TANKS FILLED

PET CARE ITEMS

- proper identification/immunization records
- ample supply of food and water
- a carrier or cage
- medications
- muzzle and leash

Watch and Warning...Know the Difference

A **WATCH** issued for your part of the coast indicates the possibility that you could experience coastal storm or hurricane conditions within 36 hours. This watch should trigger your family's disaster plan, and protective measures should be initiated—especially those actions that require extra time such as securing a boat, leaving a barrier island, etc.

A **COASTAL FLOOD WARNING** issued for your part of the coast indicates that moderate or severe coastal flooding is occurring, is imminent, or is expected within the next 12 hours.

A **HURRICANE WARNING** is issued when sustained winds of at least 74 mph are expected within 24 hours. Once this warning has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing protective actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in the water.

Stormwater pollution is one of Delaware's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of Stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of Delaware's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to Stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident or business, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day

LIMIT YOUR USE OF FERTILIZERS & PESTICIDES

Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer. Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.

Look into alternatives for pesticides.

Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.

If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.

PROPERLY USE & DISPOSE OF HAZARDOUS PRODUCTS

Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn & garden care products, motor oil, anti-freeze, and paints.

Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portion of Hazardous Products in your home or workplace. Read the label for guidance.

Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.

Recycle used motor oil.

Visit DSWA.com for locations to dispose of hazardous waste.

KEEP POLLUTION OUT OF STORM DRAINS

Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark storm drains inlets with messages to remind people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.

Do not let sewage or other waste flow into a

CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR PET

Pet owners or their keepers must pick-up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.

Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up waste.

Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.

Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

DON'T LITTER

Place litter in trash receptacles.

Recycle, Recycle, Recycle.

Participate in Community cleanups.

DISPOSE OF YARD WASTE PROPERLY

Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.

Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.

Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.
